LT. WAITT:- Yes, Mr. President. In the matter of Mr. Franklin's case, the committee felt that they were not able to give it the proper consideration in the time given and it was shelved until such time as Mr. Franklin prepared something in writing that could be gone into thoroughly. In the matter of Lt. Cox' resolution as submitted by him, the committee has made certain changes and provisions in the resolution and suggests the adoption of the following resolution:

RESOLUTION

"Proposing the Revision of the Rules and Regulations of the Federal Communications Commission to provide for the employment of daytime power of 1000 watts by Municipal Police Stations under certain conditions.

WHEREAS: The maximum power of 500 watts for Municipal Police Stations is, in certain areas of the United State insufficient to provide adequate coverage of the areas necessary to serve, and;

WHEREAS: It appears that additional daytime\*power will materially aid in the solution of Police Communications Problems of certain areas of the United States, and;

WHEREAS: Under the conditions herein proposed it appears that increased daytime\*power of Municipal Police Stations will not in any way be detrimental to the interests of the Police Communications System of the United States as a whole.

NOW THE REFORE: Be it resolved that the APCO does hereby recommend to the Federal Communi-
