MR. FISHER:- I second the motion.

PRESIDENT BATTS:- It has been moved and seconded that a committee be appointed to study the sections of the country with a view of rotating the conventions. All in favor make known by the usual sign.

PRESIDENT BATTS:- It is required by the Constitution, that the Secretary read a financial statement. Mr. Kelly has his financial statement here and I will ask him to read it at this time.

The report was read by Mr. Kelly.

MR. NELSON:- Mr. President, I move that the financial report be accepted as read.

MR. FISHER:- I second the motion. Motion carried.

PRESIDENT BATTS:- The next and very important thing is the selection of our convention city for 1937. As we have several bids here, we might request them to come up here and make a presentation concerning the thing in the order in which they presented their bids to the officers of the organization. I will name them in the <sup>same</sup> order as they were given to me. First is Cleveland, which City submitted a very beautiful bid for the <sup>convention</sup> thing. Next is Kansas City, and the next is New York City. I want to say, that we have four long telegrams from New York City making bids for the convention which I will read:
